

I. My two trips to Africa


- Tanzania (2 weeks in February 2008)
 - East Africa
 - More safaris
 - Closed vehicles
 - More crowded national parks
- <u>Botswana</u> and Zambia (2 weeks in Aug.-Sept. 2010)
 - Southern Africa
 - Fewer, but more expensive safaris
 - Open vehicles
- Wildlife in these two regions

- Different animals and animal migrations
- Different opportunities to see the same animals

II. Getting there


- How, when, and where to go? (some help with the last two questions at http://www.go2africa.com/)
- Getting ready
 - Passport, visas, shots, and anti-malaria medicine (travel medicine companies like Passport Health)
- Airline reservations, baggage weight limits, and security checks
- Going to Tanzania, Feb. 2008
 - BWI to Detroit
 - Detroit to Amsterdam (7 hrs. 55 min.)
 - Amsterdam to Arusha, Tanzania (8 hrs. 25 min.)
- Going to Botswana, Aug.-Sept. 2010
 - BWI to Atlanta (2 hrs.)

- Atlanta to Johannesburg (13+ hrs)
- Johannesburg to Botswana (charter)




III. Getting around while there

IV. Safaris

- Photo safaris
 - Easiest solution
 - More expensive
- Private safari companies
- Do-it-yourself safaris (a daunting task)
- Special considerations in planning a safari
 - Cross-country transportation
 - Land transportation
 - Charter air transportation
 - Guides (crucial for getting good photographs)
 - Accomodations

V. On safari

- My experience in Tanzania
 - Early morning safari in pop-up Land Cruisers/Land Rovers
 - Brunch
 - Afternoon safari (back to camp for showers and dinner after dark)
- My experience in Botswana
 - Early morning safari in open Land Rovers/Land Cruisers
 - Brunch
 - Afternoon tea
 - Late afternoon/night safari
 - Late dinner
- Alcoholic drinks on safari

VI. What to take on safari

- Clothing
 - As little as possible
 - Light-weight, fast drying clothing (synthetic, not cotton)
 - Long sleeve shirts and long pants
 - Soap and a clothes line
- Deet and sunblock!
- Prescription medicines (check laws first)

VII. Some recommendations for photo gear

- Essential gear
 - Two DSLR bodies, preferably high-ISO cameras
 - Stabilized lenses that zoom to at least 400 mm
 - UV/haze filters
 - Memory cards and a fast card reader
 - A laptop with Lightroom and Photoshop, power strip, surge suppressor, and power plug adapters
 - The means to make 2-3 copies of all photographs
 - A good beanbag (<u>Kinesis Safari Sack I</u>) for East (but not Southern) Africa to be filled with beans in Africa
 - Cleaning gear (rocket, Arctic butterfly, non-flammable lens cleaner and tissues) and photo tools
 - Camera manuals
- Maybe, maybe not
 - Flash unit with Better Beamer flash extender
 - Tripod (can use in camp only)

 - Sierra Club trip to Tanzania in 2008: \$5,695 + airfare + travel insurance + laundry + drinks
 - Trip arranged by professional photographer to Botswana and Zambia in 2010: \$12,500 + single supplement + airfare + travel insurance + laundry + drinks
